This year, we'd like to highlight our success in these three SDGs:

Zero Hunger: Within the first few months of 2019, *CREATE!*'s partner communities have already harvested over four tons of vegetables! Through *CREATE!*'s agriculture program, community members learn and utilize sustainable agriculture techniques to create and maintain year-round cooperative community gardens. With the availability of vegetables year-round, families will always be able to put food on the table thus improving food security and nutritional outcomes.


Clean Water & Sanitation: Through well-rehabilitation, the installation of solar-powered pumping systems, and construction of above ground water storage, two new *CREATE!* communities gained access to clean, abundant water in late 2018. This year *CREATE!* plans to partner with two more communities, helping over 2,000 more people gain access to clean water!

Affordable & Clean Energy: Here in the desert, the sun is an abundant source of energy. So instead of using fossil fuels to run the water pumps, *CREATE!*'s partner communities use solar power technology! Another way villages are utilizing clean energy is with *CREATE!*'s improved cookstove. The improved cookstove is built from free, organic, and locally available materials. By using less firewood, improved cookstoves save trees and benefit the local environment. It also cooks food faster which saves women time and money.

Voices from Senegal:

In Senegal, there's a Wolof proverb that goes "Xamxam dafay weey, xaalis day jeex." Essentially, this means that you can't take away knowledge. We believe in teaching skills and helping communities gain new knowledge so that they can develop self-sufficiency and sustain their communities as well as the environment generation after generation.





Protecting the Heart of Her Home: Introducing Improved Cookstoves



The kitchen is often referred to as the heart of one's home. It's where families and guests gather together to share meals and conversation, and children commonly play while their parents prepare food. Ali Thiam, a mother of ten, prepares a meal for her family over her improved cookstove in the village of Santhie. She stirs a delicious meal in her favorite cooking pot and smiles as her children run in and out of the hut. "With the improved cookstove, we live in safety in the community," she tells us. But it didn't always used to be this way.

Ali used to cook meals over a "three-stone fire", a traditional open fire where a cooking pot would rest atop three stones above the open flames. Open fires often use an excessive amount of firewood and are hazardous to children and animals. "The traditional fire methods are inefficient, and my kitchen used to be very dirty," Ali explains. She also notes the damage open fires had on her health and the

environment. "It contributed not only to climate change and environmental degradation but also negatively impacted women and children's health."

However, things changed when Ali decided to build her own improved cookstove for her kitchen. Ali and her village learned to build improved cookstoves from free, organic, and locally available materials with the training they received from *CREATE!*'s technicians. Improved cookstoves are safer and use less firewood, which saves women time and money, while benefiting the environment. Ali tells us, "I no longer need to waste time collecting wood in the forest because I only need a few pieces for cooking."

Now, Ali has more time to do what she enjoys, like tending to her garden block and spending time with her children. Thanks to the participation and hard work of Ali and her community, her family and generations to come can enjoy cleaner, safer cooking in the heart of their home as well as a healthier and richer environment!

Staff Spotlight: Charlotte Odille Diedhiou

Charlotte Odille Diedhiou has always had a passion for agriculture and has been described as a natural humanitarian. This is one of the reasons she chose to work at CREATE! over a year ago. Charlotte is very enthusiastic about her work in the communities and says the other technicians at CREATE! have become like a second family to her.

"As a technician, I do my best to give community members the skills and knowledge they need to be self-sufficient," Charlotte tells us. She trains CREATE!'s partner communities in the use of different appropriate technology methods such as building improved cookstoves, sustainable agriculture techniques, and financial literacy. "CREATE! intervenes in areas where weather conditions are difficult," Charlotte describes. "[My work] helps rural communities improve their living conditions through environmental protection programs."



Charlotte explains that she sees much of the younger generation having to leave their families and villages in order to find income generating opportunities. But through the training that she and the other technicians provide, community members are turning their fate around. "They have the possibility to stay with their family and work in the community garden," Charlotte says. She hopes that for the future, villages will continue to pass on this information from generation to generation, "Communities will be able to teach their children so that they can continue the activities in the future."

98% of women in our active communities achieved minimum dietary diversity, a verifiable nutrition indicator, in the first quarter of 2019.

4+ tons of nutritious vegetables produced in total during January and February of 2019.



90% of women from active communities participate in Voluntary Savings and Lending Associations (VSLA).

CFA 10916 (\$20) is saved on an average per month by each woman.



70% + members are using water from rehabilitated wells for household use.

100 liters of water is available daily for personal use by each household.



80% reduction in firewood consumption on an average through the use of improved cookstoves.

603 households have well-maintained cookstoves as of February 2019.
